What's on Our President's Mind?

I had the great pleasure of attending the biennial Council of the League of Women Voters of the United States (LWVUS) in June with outgoing state president Bobbie Heisterkamp. Two representatives from each state League met for almost four days at the National Conference Center in Leesburg, VA – a place NOT conveniently located to anything except walking trails. We were there to work!

Speakers from various universities, LWVUS President Elizabeth McNamara, LWVUS staff and board members presented excellent sessions with new information and key ideas. Sessions focused on redistricting, voter ID laws, the upcoming LWVUS national studies and on *key ideas* to sustain League.



I am particularly excited about **these key ideas**:

- **Focus on and strengthen League impact and visibility:**
Are we visible in our communities? Do we understand that, across the country, the League of Women Voters is highly valued and respected? We need to be visible through our actions in our communities.
- **Brag about League achievements:**
If someone went to your League's website, would s/he *immediately* see what you've done during the past year, or would the website simply say "we're off for the summer"? Do we have attractive flyers that talk about our achievements? Are these flyers available throughout our community?
- **Talk engagement instead of "membership" and engage people because of our achievements and our passions; create excitement about our actions:**
League typically has an older membership of primarily Anglo women. We talk about recruiting members, but how do we engage people – women and men? How do we engage people in critical civic activities? How do we excite people about joining with us? How can people find a *meaningful* niche or "job" with League?
- **2016 Elections - Educate and register under-represented voters: The LWVUS goal is that Leagues will register 100,000 new voters before the 2016 elections!**
The League of Women Voters was formed because of disenfranchisement. Women won the vote and the new League educated about the responsibility of voting. LWVUS and various state delegates to Council talked about the need to educate and register under-represented people in the U.S. They talked about forming coalitions with various citizens' rights groups and about going to immigrant centers to educate and register new voters.

This is exciting stuff! The LWVCO Board will use these key ideas to guide discussion and goal setting at our August Board Retreat. *I hope your local League will consider doing the same.* The League of Women Voters is a critical voice in today's world. **Our job is to keep the League vital and renewed.**

PROP BB, THE ONLY STATEWIDE BALLOT ISSUE

Proposition BB, referred to the ballot by the General Assembly, would allow the State to keep and spend \$63.5 million in tax revenue rather than refund it to taxpayers. This tax revenue comes from the sales tax and excise tax on the sale of marijuana.

The State would spend this revenue to provide \$40 million for public school building construction, and for needs such as law enforcement, youth programs, and marijuana education and prevention programs. Refunds would go to retail marijuana cultivation facilities, to retail marijuana purchasers, and to taxpayers.

In 2013 when voters were asked to approve the marijuana tax proposed by the Legislature, there were two revenue estimates in the CO "Blue Book" from the taxes on marijuana. One estimate was for the overall state revenue subject to the state constitutional limits found in TABOR. The second estimate was for the *new* taxes associated with retail marijuana. (This refund requirement on the new taxes is for the first year only. All future taxes on marijuana can be retained.)

The retail tax from marijuana sales was lower than the estimate but due to an improving economy and the marijuana tax revenue, the *overall* state revenue was higher than the estimate found in the 2013 Blue Book. Since the overall revenue exceeded the estimate, the state is constitutionally required to give a refund to taxpayers unless voters approve having the state retain and spend the refund amount. The refund is equal to the revenue from the new taxes on marijuana in the 2014-15 fiscal year or \$63.5 million.

LEAGUE DAY PARKING AND LODGING

Parking at the hotel is offered in two onsite garages accessed from the front of the hotel. The larger garage lot is below the hotel, accessed by a ramp on the left (south) side of the hotel entrance, the second is above the hotel and is accessed on the right (north) side of the hotel entrance.

PROGRAM PROMPTED LIVELY DEBATE AT CONVENTION

Sixty voting delegates to the 2015 LWVCO Convention in Boulder approved by majority vote the program recommended by the LWVCO Board. This program includes the following items:

- To retain all current LWVCO positions in the areas of Government, Natural Resources, and Social Policy
- A study to update the LWVCO Health Care Position to include Behavioral Health

Two not-recommended items were brought to the floor of the convention:

- A concurrence with the LWV Boulder County Position on Minimum/Living Wage
- A study to update the LWVCO Position on Hydraulic Fracturing

Both items received a majority vote on Saturday for consideration on Sunday, but neither received the 3/5 vote necessary for adoption of a not-recommended item.

The introduction of the two not-recommended items provided the Convention with a lively and productive debate. Many thanks to the Boulder County League for proposing concurrence with their Position on Minimum/Living Wage and to the Larimer County League for proposing the update to the Hydraulic Fracturing Position. Both topics are of great interest to many LWVCO members. The discussion provided an incentive for the League to stay current on the issues and perhaps pursue them further.

[Ed. Note: At convention's close Karen Connor of the Montrose League invited all CO local Leagues to Montrose for next May's LWVCO Council. Their invitation resulted in a lengthy article in The Watch, a widely read regional newspaper out of Telluride, describing the Montrose League's recent activities with a photo, as well as information about the League of Women Voters in general.]

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH STUDY UNDERWAY

The League of Women Voters of Colorado's Behavioral Health Study is underway! All local Leagues have received the study materials and the consensus questions. This study's purpose is to update the current LWVCO Health Care position to include behavioral health. Study materials are the completely updated and **NEW** Behavioral Health Task Force 2015 Report: *An Overview of Colorado's Behavioral Health System*.

The scope of the study deals with Access to Quality Behavioral Health Care. Study materials include an overview of 1) the need for behavioral health services, 2) Colorado's current service delivery system including the criminal justice system, 3) funding for services, 4) stigma and barriers to effective service delivery, 5) behavioral health and gun violence, 6) current trends, including integrated care, and 7) new and promising practices.

The timeline for the Behavioral Health Study is:

August 2015: Study materials and consensus questions sent via email to local League leaders and will be available on the LWVCO website.

Late summer -December 1, 2015: Local Leagues hold briefings and consensus meetings.

December 1, 2015: Consensus reports from Leagues due to LWVCO.

December 7, 2015: Consensus reports and resulting draft position(s) to LWVCO Board for approval.

By September 1, the LWVCO Behavioral Health Study Committee will provide an updated PowerPoint presentation with highlights of the study materials to all local Leagues. Study committee members will act as liaisons to their local Leagues and can present the Power Point.

Thank you to all members (and non-members) of the Behavioral Health Task Force who have worked so hard gathering information, writing, proofreading and editing the report/study materials!

Connect with MLD!

The Membership and Leadership Development (MLD) program is going strong in Colorado. At present 14 of 19 CO local Leagues are participating in this national League program to grow membership and develop leaders. We hope that those of you who attended Convention or Leadership Recharge learned more and were inspired to take full advantage of MLD resources. Local Leagues have been asked to respond by August 30 with a commitment to participate in the MLD coaching program for 2015-16. We welcome each League to stay with us or join in anew.

Information and registration materials for the MLD training to be offered in Denver on September 18, the day before League Day, at the same venue, have been emailed to all local Leagues. Throughout its 86-year history, the League of Women Voters of Colorado (LWVCO) has played a vital role in lobbying for government and social reform legislation. In 2015 several bills passed that fall under League positions, two of which stand out: HB 1043, the DUI bill for which we used a Call to Action, and SB 204, that moved the Child Protection Ombudsman out of the agency it was supposed to oversee. This bill took a lot of lobbying of various branches of government. Several bills we opposed were successfully defeated. LWVCO donations support the Legislative Action Committee (LAC); our advocacy corps at the Colorado legislature; our staff lobbyist Christine Watson; and *The Legislative Letter*, published every two weeks during the legislative session.

LOCAL LEAGUES RECEIVE PROJECT FUND AND EZ GRANTS

LWVCO is pleased to announce grants awarded to five local Leagues. We congratulate these Leagues and look forward to their written reports by April 2016, detailing the outcome of their projects.

Project Fund Grants:

- LWV of Boulder County, \$1500, for their special project (membership) of the fall semester paid college internship position to focus on youth involvement in League activities, specifically to attract college age individuals to become educated and involved with the League.
- LWV of Estes Park, \$785 for their special project to purchase LWV banners and table runners, for voter education and membership recruitment, One will replace the old 3' x 6' outdoor banner with one that is all-weather and high wind-resistant.
- LWV of Mesa County, \$1500, for their special project to hire a professional website designer to upgrade their current website to support video links and to be read by other electronic devices, to include one-year maintenance, hosting, and training two League members to maintain the site.

EZ Grants:

- LWV of Chaffee County \$500, towards purchase of VOTE411 ads for nine months in two newspapers in Buena Vista and Salida.
- LWV of Montezuma County, \$300, Great Decisions project, to purchase materials for each group in Dolores and Mancos.

A reminder: Project Fund grants meet the following objective guidelines:

- serve the LWVCO program, education, and/or outreach goals
- are suitable for replication by other Leagues
- are conducted in Colorado
- meet the strategic goal of LWVCO to strengthen local leagues and promote the Membership Leadership and Development (MLD) goals for increasing membership and developing leadership.

The EZ Grant applies to four specific projects with maximum amounts: Great Decision materials (\$300), public meetings of representatives of multiple levels of local government (\$300), ads for VOTE411.org (\$500), and contests involving local high schools (\$500).

Both grant types are funded by the LWVCO Eva Fikova Endowment Fund. Grant applications are accepted between May 1 and June 30 for the following year. In addition to Liz Nick, Sonia Koetting, LWVCO Communications Director, and Sue Vaughan, LWVCO Board Secretary, serve on the LWVCO Grant Committee, which reads the applications and recommends recipients to the LWVCO Board for final decision.
